Title: Predicting Post-treatment Relapse with the MMPI-2-RF

Chair: Frederick Wechsler, Ph.D., Psy.D., ABPP

Description: The study investigated whether personality factors measured by the MMPI2-RF could predict abstinence following substance abuse treatment. Fifty-one subjects' abstinence was determined via phone interviews at several intervals following participation in a Partial Hospitalization Program. The RC4 (antisocial behavior) scale of the MMPI-2- RF was a significant predictor of relapse. These findings support previous research that found as individuals' MMPI-2- RF t-scores increased on the RC4 scale, the likelihood of poor treatment outcomes increased.
